## THE RECENT TREND OF MORTALITY IN ENGLAND AND WALES

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In continuation of the tables given in  $\mathcal{J}.I.A$ . Vol. LXXI, pp. 411-12, the central death rates in age groups for males and females separately in the year 1940 are shown in Table 1, and the ratios of these death rates to the corresponding rates for the years 1930-31-32 are shown in Table 2. Both the deaths and the populations from which the death rates have been derived are limited to civilians, but civilian deaths due to the war are included. The exclusion of men and women in the armed forces should be borne in mind when studying the trend of mortality in the younger adult age groups; it has also had a disturbing effect (in the case of men) on the rates for the broader age groups at the foot of the tables and on the crude rate for all ages combined.
