Report of the Committee

Presented at the Annual General Meeting on 18 October 1988

The Committee submits its Report on the work of the Society during the seventy-eighth session, which ended on 30 June 1988, together with the accounts for that period.

1. Membership

The average attendance at general meetings was 90 which is somewhat lower than in recent years (109 in 1986/87 and 112 in 1985/86). The Society was pleased to host two meetings on educational matters, one with the Board of Examiners and one with the Education Working Party of the Futures Committee.

A Society prize was awarded to A. Kerr and I. Rogers for their paper entitled 'Repackaging the Life Office'.

3. Accounts

The last year has seen a further growth in the activities of the Staple Inn Actuarial Society. With the growth in the number of courses, and the continued popularity of FIASCO (particularly amongst advertisers of job vacancies for actuarial students), turnover has increased to $\pounds 178,000$ from $\pounds 157,000$ in the previous year. Any surplus funds of the Society continue to be used for the benefit of members, with particular emphasis on education and training.

4. Courses

The number and range of courses run by the Society continues to grow. Several new courses have been introduced this year and others are being developed. In all, some 637 members of the Society have received a total of 780 man-days of training.

The main feature of that year was the outstanding level of demand for the new Study Management courses, at which 468 students attended. An Investment course was held in October, two Life Office Taxation courses were run in February and March, a Marketing course in February, Stategic Planning courses in March and June and a Legal Principles of Pension Funds course in May. A new Accounting Principles for Pensions course in June attracted 70 participants. The non-life computer game was again organized primarily to assist those studying for the General Insurance examination.

Arrangements are in hand to repeat the Life Office Taxation course and to hold new courses on Expert Systems and Presentation Skills in the autumn. Other courses for the forthcoming session will be publicized in due course.

5. Publications

Volumes 30 and 31 of the Journal were prepared under the joint editorship of A. Saunders and P. J. Cooper.

The Society's magazine, FIASCO, had a successful eleventh year under the editorship of S. M. Southall, who handed over editorial responsibility to E. M. Smyth at the beginning of 1988. The Committee is actively considering with the editor ways of expanding the scope of FIASCO.

The Society's thanks are due to the editors of both the Journal and FIASCO.

A new logo for the Society was adopted following a competition to seek designs in FIASCO.

6. Professional Liaison

A liaison meeting was held with the secretaries of other actuarial societies in the U.K. and Channel Islands. The Society was also represented at a number of the annual general meetings and dinners of those societies.

The Society continued to be represented on the Research Committee, Sessional Meetings Committee, Medals and Prizes Committee, Historical Texts Sub-Committee, the Public Relations Committee and Futures Committee of the Institute.

The Society participated in two separate joint working parties with the Young Chartered Accountants Group of London, considering problems where the professional responsibilities of actuaries and accountants interact in the fields of pensions and general insurance. A third working party to consider life assurance aspects may also be established.

Liaison with the Association of Pension Lawyers is also developing. Liaison continues with local groups of the Pensions Management Institute and with the Royal Statistical Society and the Society is represented on the Young Professionals Group.

7. Projects

The Society has provided or agreed to provide financial assistance towards a number of projects including:

- continuing to meet 50% of the acquisition costs of historical texts for the Institute Library
- two grants of £10,000 to finance a project on General Insurance Reserving methods
- a grant of £10,000 to assist with the finance for the production of a new textbook in life contingencies
- £2,500 towards subsidising the costs of running Study Management courses
- a grant of £9,800 to finance a research project into the RICS property valuations historic database
- a provisional allocation of £15,000 towards improving the audio/visual facilities in Staple Inn

The Committee continues to apply three criteria for the provision of financial assistance to projects:

1. The project should be of benefit to members of the Society.

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- 2. There should be a clearly defined end product which is capable of being linked with the Society.
- 3. The maximum commitment of funds must be determined at outset and the Society cannot give any commitment to continuing funding in subsequent years.

The Committee will be pleased to consider any further proposals of suitable projects requiring financial support.

8. Social

Buffet suppers were held at a local public house following Sessional meetings, and were generally well attended.

The Annual Supper was held at the London Press Centre on 23 October 1987 following the Annual General Meeting, and was attended by 460 members and guests. The principal guest was M. H. Field, President of the Institute.

The twentieth Golf Meeting with Gallio, Fellowship and 59 clubs took place at the Addington Golf Club, Croydon on 7 June when 21 players represented the Society. The Gal Fell Bowl was won by The Staple Inn Actuarial Society.

A number of successful social and sporting events were arranged. Sporting events included a darts tournament and five-a-side football tournament. A games evening, summer saunter and a winter wander also proved popular events.

Once again the Society competed for the Candida Trophy sailing event which took place off Bembridge, Isle of Wight on 11-12 June.

9. Administration

The Committee thanks C. D. Daykin for his advice and help during the year as the member appointed by Council. The Committee is also most grateful for the encouragement and support which it received from the President, members of Council and other senior actuaries and particularly wishes to thank those who took the chair at the Society's meetings.

The Committee very gladly records its appreciation of the essential part played in the administration of the Society by C. D. A. Mackie and the staff at the Institute office.
